

I would like to thank my fellow trustees and all the staff and volunteers for everything they have done to support the work and success of KCV.







This year, our work and projects created 8 new jobs in Folkestone, Dover and Thanet. All roles are designed to support and better connect communities through volunteering. As well creating and securing funding for 8 new posts, we also appointed 2 Government funded Kickstart apprentice roles.

What next?

We expect our services to be in higher demand over the coming year as Volunteer Involving Organisations look to rebuild their services and volunteer base. If we are to support the Covid-19 recovery of our member Volunteer Involving Organisations and the volunteering needs of the communities we serve, then we must strengthen our capacity and resilience. Over the coming year we will:


Implement an income and growth strategy as part of our Business Plan:

- We have developed a comprehensive fundraising strategy which explores the need to improve our fundraising mix and sets funding targets
- We are exploring ways of expanding our services to support organisations, including our own Training offer and Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS)
- We are implementing changes to make volunteering accessible to the wider community
- We will rebuild and restore our own services impacted by Covid-19

Build in the attainment of our core strategic priorities:

- Develop diversified fundraising revenue that improves the funding mix
- Grow operating revenue so we can better meet operating costs / central overheads
- Replenish unrestricted reserves
- Maintain tight control of operating costs
- Implement recommendations of Evolve Heath Check Review carried out in 2021
